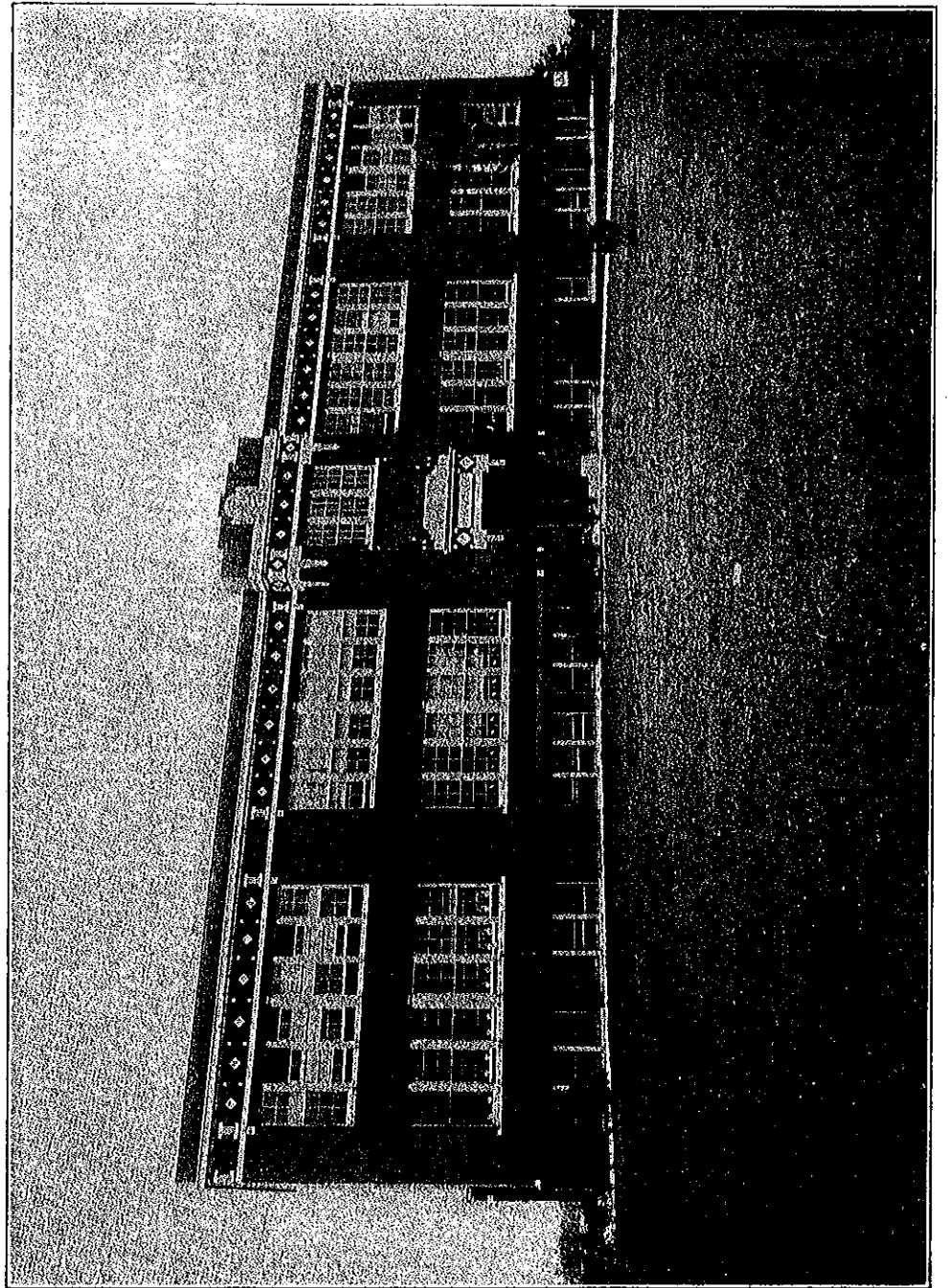

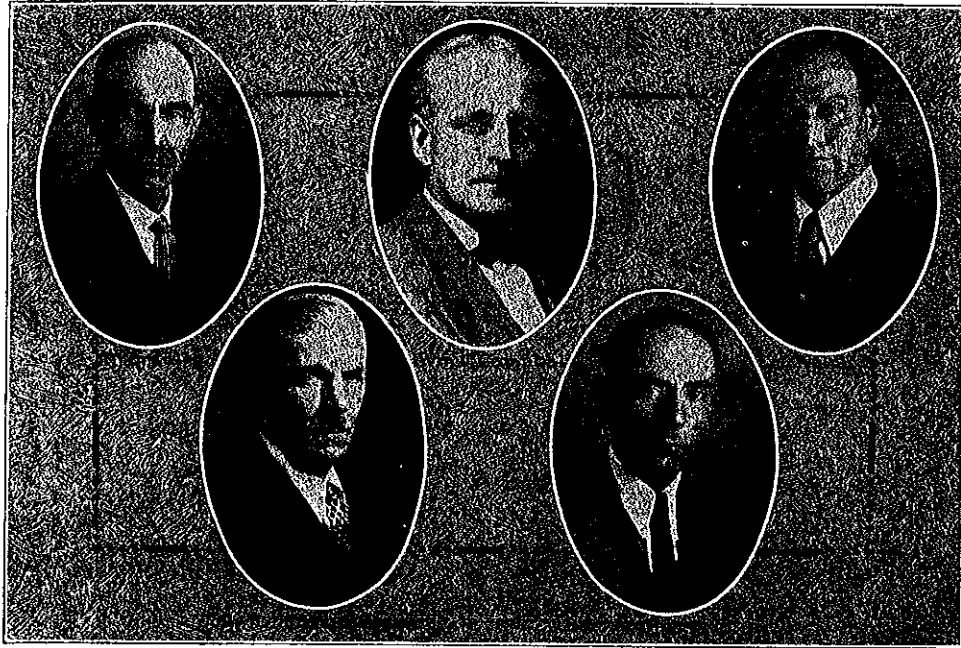
Foreword

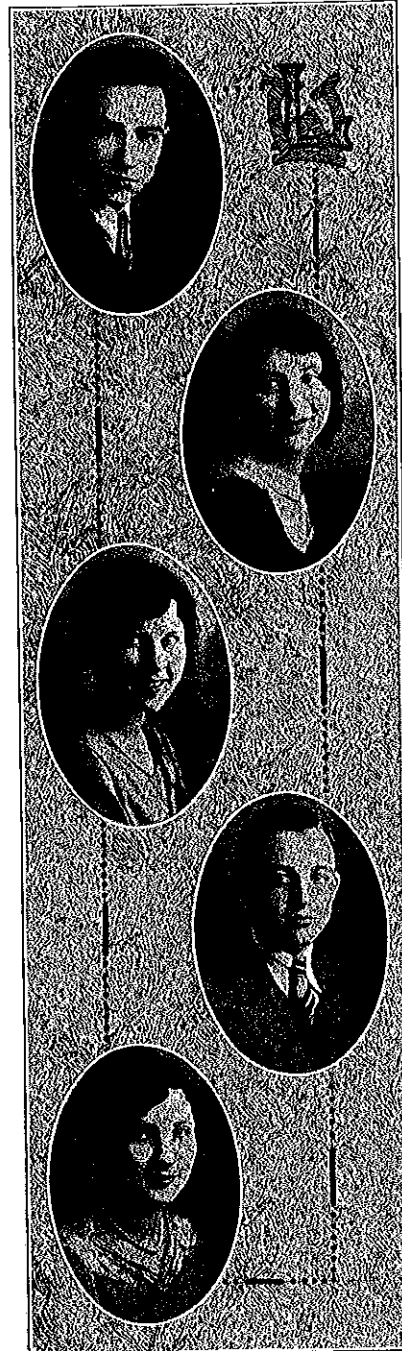
Board of Education

We have decided to wear caps and gowns this year at graduation and Baccalaureate Services. Commencement exercises were held at the High School June 13. The program is as follows:

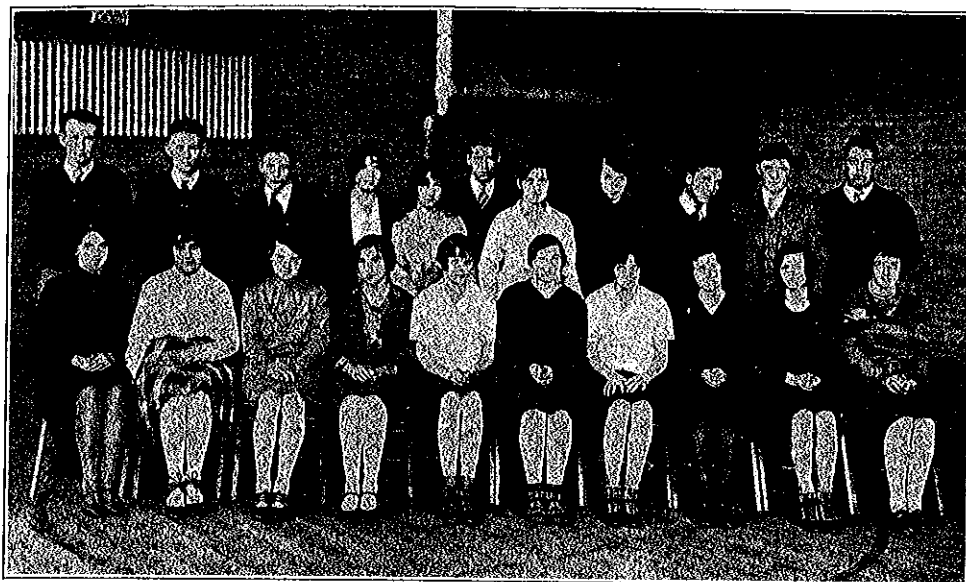

The girls also showed their ability by successfully serving the multitude of men and boys at the annual Father and Son Banquet.



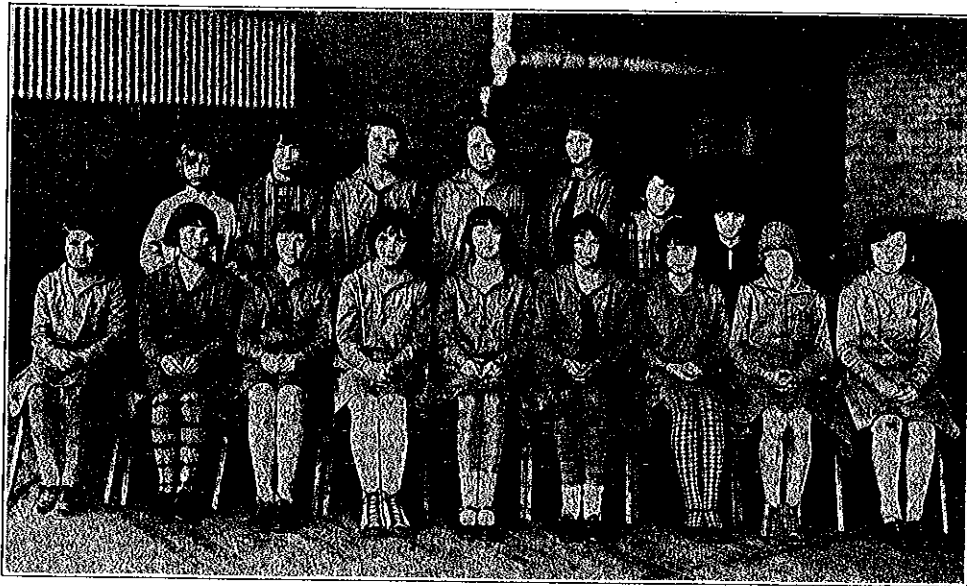

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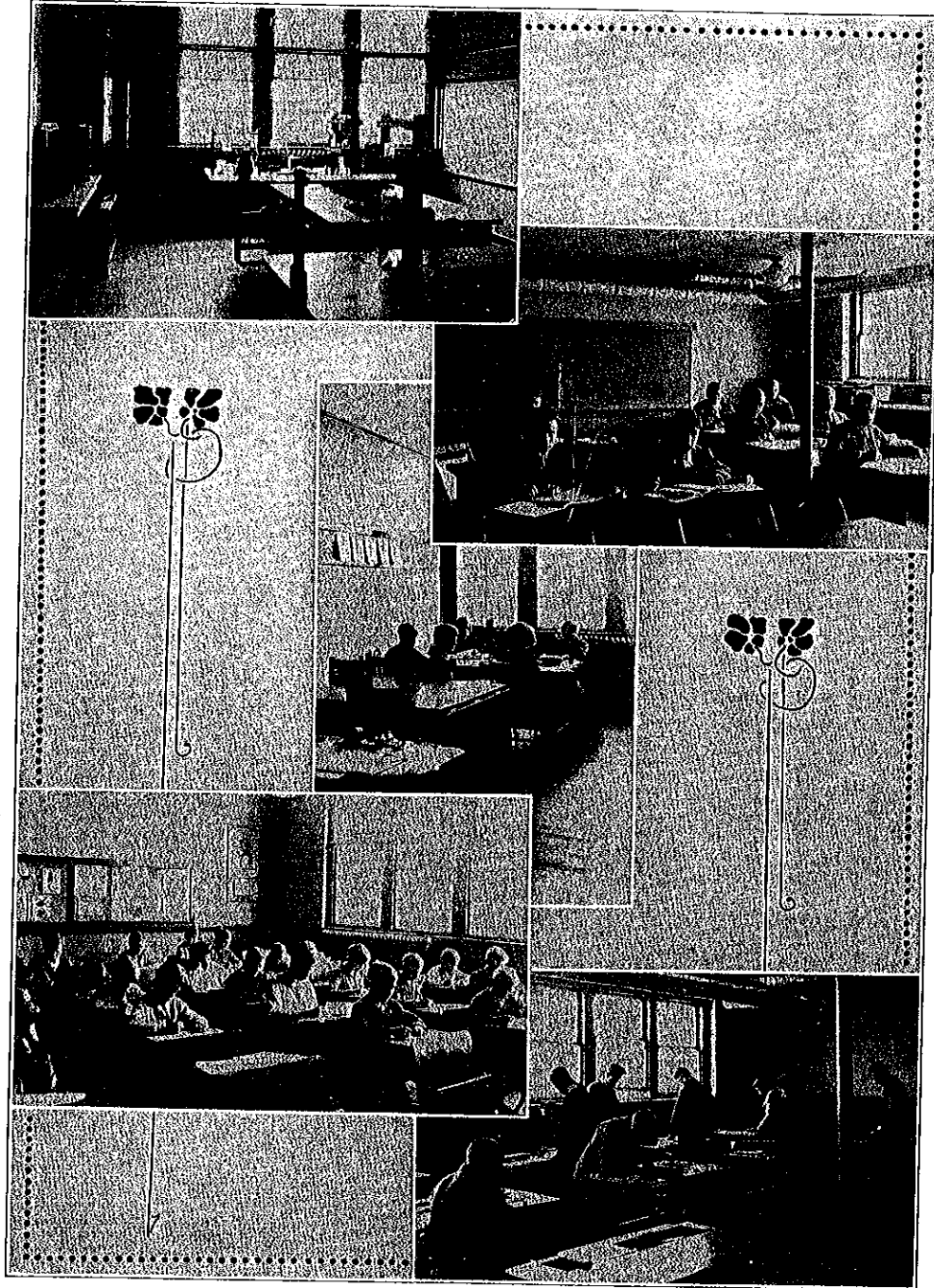
